Week 6

School Improvement Plan (SIP)

For those of you new to our school planning, we are diving into our four year SIP 2021-2024 with enthusiasm whilst maintaining focus on our three strategic directions.

Strategic Direction 1: Student Growth and Attainment

To improve student learning outcomes in literacy and numeracy by developing and implementing quality programs informed by data. Teaching and learning will feature explicit instruction and effective feedback, underpinned by evidence based research and robust evaluative processes.

Strategic Direction 2: Wellbeing and Positive Partnerships

To foster a cohesive and inclusive school environment where positive partnerships are nurtured and holistic programs are responsive to identified student needs ensuring that every student is known, valued and cared for.

Strategic Direction 3: Learning Culture and Quality Practices

To provide evidence based professional learning and development opportunities evoking perpetual growth and passion in all teachers, inspiring them to reflect and refine practices. Embed evaluative thinking in collaborative learning frameworks ensuring that every student, every teacher and every leader demonstrates growth and improvement.

In a short span of 5 weeks, we have already used student data to establish targeted support groupings to cater for a variety of need, delivered quality teacher professional learning in reading fluency, vocabulary, guided reading and maths essentials. Revitalised and strengthened parent partnerships via Meet the Teacher Zoom sessions and are working towards an improved means of tracking and monitoring student progression and growth.

Meet the Teacher Zoom Sessions

Meet the Teacher sessions were well attended and highly successful. For some working parents it gave them greater flexibility and freedom in connecting with the school. Working in partnership with families is of high priority and essential in setting students up for success. In the future we hope to continue working with a hybrid model, a mix of technology and face to face to cater for a diverse array of need. 
Fathering Project

- 42. Sort the recycling



School Maintenance

Several air conditioning units will be replaced/installed to ensure all our students are working in optimal environments conducive to learning. New innovative learning hubs and storage will be established to maximise existing space both in A Block and D Block. In addition windows in two D Block classrooms will be replaced. The new windows will feature external doors that will open up to external learning courtyards, extending classrooms and allowing students to work in a variety of modes and spaces.

COVID reminder in alignment with Department of Education guidelines

Students and staff must not attend school or work if they are unwell, even with the mildest of symptoms including fever, cough, sore throat, shortness of breath, loss of taste, and loss of smell. Students need to be symptom free and a negative COVID-19 test result must be received and sighted by the school prior to their return to school. Students who do not undertake a COVID-19 test are not permitted to return to school for a 10 day period and they must be symptom free for at least 3 days prior to their return.

Students who have seasonal allergic rhinitis or another condition that presents similarly to flu-like symptoms are still required to get tested for COVID-19 and return a negative test result. Where their symptoms continue beyond 10 days, students should provide documentation from their GP confirming their symptoms are typical for their condition.

COVID-19 testing for very young students or students with complex health or disability may be challenging. In these situations, parent/carer are asked to have their child assessed by their medical practitioner. Where a medical practitioner determines that a COVID-19 test is not indicated, a medical certificate must be provided to the school to confirm that the student does not have symptoms that warrant a COVID-19 test. The certificate must also indicate that the student is able to return to the school environment.

Parents/ Carers Visiting the School

In an aim to reduce the number of sign in requirements the procedure has been simplified:

- 1. Sign the visitor log book
- 2. Check in using the Service NSW COVID safe QR code

High School Intake Areas for 2022 Onward


Effective Term 1, 2022, the intake areas for Picnic Point HS, Menai HS, Sir Joseph Banks HS, East Hills Girls HS and East Hills Boys HS will change for prospective Year 7 students in the East Hills area to provide a choice of both co-educational and single sex options.

The change will affect our Year 6 students completing the High School Expression of Interest (EOI) process in Term 1, 2021 for high school entry in Term 1, 2022.


The new intake areas apply to Year 7 enrolments only in 2022 and will gradually extend to all grades by 2025. Hence, existing 2021 intake areas will remain in place for Years 8 to 12 in 2022. Enrolment applications for older students or students living outside of the new intake area, will be considered on a case by case basis in line with the Department's enrolment policy.

Students who are in area for Panania Public School will now have an option of East Hills Girls Technology HS, East Hills Boys HS or Picnic Point HS. To confirm your local high school options please visit https://schoolfinder.education.nsw.gov.au/

- . Operate when the orange 'CHILDREN CROSSING' flags are displayed.
- Legally the strongest marked pedestrian crossings for managing traffic and road safety in the local streets around schools.
- · Offer more protection than zebra crossings.

CHILDREN'S CROSSINGS

- By law MUST STOP their car at the stop line and wait until all pedestrians on the crossing and those about to step onto the crossing have crossed the road.
- Fines of \$572 and 4 demerit points apply.

PEDESTRIANS

 Must walk between the two red and white posts on each side of the road and keep within that area.


