Enhancing a Sense of Belonging

Promoting student voice and choice is paramount for fostering a positive and empowering learning environment that caters to the diverse needs and interests of students. By allowing students to express their opinions, preferences, and ideas, we can cultivate a sense of ownership, autonomy, and intrinsic motivation among learners.

• Enhanced Engagement and Motivation

When students have a say in their learning experiences, they are more likely to feel invested and engaged in the educational process. By providing opportunities for students to choose topics of study, projects or learning activities can lead to higher levels of enthusiasm and commitment to learning.

• Personalised Learning

Every student is unique, with individual interests, learning styles, and strengths. By incorporating student voice and choice, learning experiences can be tailored to diverse needs of students. This approach ensures that students receive instruction that is relevant, meaningful, and conducive to their academic growth and success.

• Development of Critical Thinking and Decision-Making Skills

Given the opportunity to analyse options, weigh consequences, and make choices, students become more adept at evaluating information, solving problems, and taking ownership of their learning journey. These skills are essential for success in academic, professional, and personal endeavours.

• Empowerment and Self-Efficacy

Empowering students to voice their opinions and make choices fosters a sense of agency and self-efficacy. When students see that their voices are valued and their choices respected, they develop confidence in their abilities and become active participants in their educational experience. This empowerment extends beyond the classroom, empowering students to advocate for themselves and effect positive change in their communities.

• Promotion of Social and Emotional Learning

Providing opportunities for student voice and choice supports the development of social and emotional skills. Through collaborative decision-making, students learn to communicate effectively, negotiate differences, and work cooperatively with peers. This fosters a sense of belonging and connectedness within the school community and promotes empathy, tolerance, and respect for diverse perspectives.

• Preparation for Citizenship and Leadership

In a democratic society, the ability to express oneself, participate in decision-making processes, and advocate for change is essential. By promoting student voice and choice, schools prepare students to become active, informed, and responsible citizens who contribute positively to society. Additionally, students develop leadership skills as they take on roles of influence and responsibility within their school communities.

This term, all students have been encouraged to express their voice via participating in the '*Principal for the Day*' competition. Students were advised that a mural is being planned for C Block, on the wall facing Picnic Point Road. Criteria included:

- Inviting and welcoming
- Bright and attractive
- Reflective of our community
- Colours and design that complements existing ANZAC mural on A Block.

Winning submission was entered by Emma Harris in Year 6.

Drafting processes included inspiration boards and revisions based on student-teacher collaborations. Some adjustments were made including the addition of text. Panania is an Aboriginal word that means "Sun rising in the east and shining on the hills". Congratulations to Emma and all students who actively took part.



As a parent or carer, you are an important part of our school community. We know that you play a crucial role in helping your child become a motivated learner. Communication between our school and our community is critical for us to partner together.

ISLA BROWN HENS VISITED 5/6M

Stage 3 are learning about Living Worlds in Science this term. One of the underlying topics within our unit is sustainability. We have investigated creating natural fibres and foods from the land.

Earlier this week, Paige and her mother Kylie brought their Isla Brown chickens in to visit us. We were able to pat them and watch how they grazed and moved about, while Paige shared some interesting facts about these beautiful birds. Some fascinating facts we learned through this shared experience was that this breed is known for laying eggs. They lay up to two eggs per day but don't lay when they're regrowing their feathers after moulting. This is due to their body using all its energy on regrowing feathers.

They consume weeds, grass, fruit and vegetables, grains, corn, rice, toast or any food scraps the family may have. Isa Browns will consume small rocks and pebbles to help break up the seeds they have ingested.
