Student Reports

Our dedicated teachers are diligently assessing, analysing, and triangulating student data from various sources to prepare comprehensive student reports. This process aligns with the NSW Department of Education (DoE) recommendations and <u>Curriculum planning and programming, assessing and reporting to parents K-12 policy</u> guidelines, ensuring that we accurately reflect each student's progress and achievements.

This year, we are implementing a couple of important changes to our reporting system. Firstly, within the A-E grading scale "sound" will be described as "expected'. This change aims to provide clearer expectations for our students and parents/carers regarding their learning outcomes. Additionally, we are excited to include the phases for English as an Additional Language or Dialect (EAL/D) in our reports. Students identified as EAL/D typically come from households where an additional language is spoken, and they may possess varying degrees of proficiency in both their home language and English.

Our diverse Panania Public School community is enriched by a wide range of languages, and being identified as EAL/D allows us to access valuable DoE funding. This funding is instrumental in supporting our students, enabling us to implement differentiated programs that cater to the unique needs of all learners, from those with high potential to those with learning disabilities.

The additional funding allows us to provide extra teacher support within classrooms and, in some instances, small group assistance. We are committed to ensuring that every student receives the support they need to thrive academically and socially. Thank you for your continued partnership in your child's education. We look forward to sharing the progress and achievements of our students in the upcoming reports.

EAL/D Phases in Brief


Beginning English is divided into Limited Literacy Background and Some Print Literacy in first language. Students in the Beginning phase with some print literacy may have age-appropriate understanding of literacy and conceptual ideas in their first language or dialect. These students can draw upon this understanding as they learn English. They require high levels of explicit teaching, message abundancy and contextual support for the language demands of tasks. Students with limited literacy background may require further support such as explicit instruction about left to right directionality, how print marks convey meaning, pen/pencil grip, letter–sound relationships and punctuation when reading, viewing and writing. A student in the initial beginning phases may require intensive support for 6 months to 1 year, depending on progress. **Emerging English** students have a growing degree of print literacy and oral language competency with English. Students may communicate verbally in familiar situations with commonly used vocabulary. They require explicit targeted language support and contextual scaffolding in the classroom. They may also require support developing an understanding of register, inference and sentence structure (including using connectives, spelling and punctuation conventions) as well as support to develop subject-specific vocabulary. A student may be in this phase for 1–2 years, depending on progress.

Developing English students may communicate with greater fluency but still require support to produce extended pieces of spoken and written English, and to understand how audience and purpose inform language choices and text structures. Support is required to build subject-specific and technical vocabulary, to understand and use colloquialisms, idioms and imagery, and to develop inferential understanding. Explicit instruction in use of linking conjunctions and cohesive devices will support students to develop the skills to form complex sentences. A student may be in this phase for 2 to 5 years, depending on progress.

Consolidating students have a sound knowledge of spoken and written English, including a growing competency with academic language. Students may produce work independently and demonstrate increased success in the classroom due to their level of proficiency in SAE. These students may still require targeted support with the academic language and cultural demands of a task. Explicit instruction of abstract, technical and subject-specific language as well as pre-teaching assumed cultural knowledge and cultural conceptualisations will support students to fully access learning and demonstrate success. A student may be in this phase for a period of 5 to 7 years depending on progress.

Further, in Kindergarten there is an additional EAL/D Learning Progression divided into Beginning, Emerging, Developing and Consolidating that provides specific characteristics and pointers to support the development of English Language Skills.











CHILDREN'S ONLINE PRIVACY CODE

The Office of the Australian Information Commissioner (OAIC), the Australian Government's privacy regulator, is seeking input from parents and carers to assist them in its development of the Children's Online Privacy Code (the Code).

The Code will put children at the centre of privacy protections in Australia. By the time a child turns 13, it's estimated that 72 million pieces of data will have been collected about them. The aim of the Code is to strengthen privacy protections for the handling of children's personal information.

About the program

Owl Kids is a group program supporting children who have or are experiencing parental separation. The program was created to provide children with a safe space to develop their emotional literacy through creative therapy, as well as the opportunity to interact with other children in similar situations.

For many children, their parents' separation can change how they view or make sense of the world, their relationships, and safety.

Who is Owl Kids for?

- The program is suitable for children that:
- are aged 7 12 years old
 are adjusting to some of the difficulties
- of parental separation
- have already or about to be told about their parents' separation
- have been impacted by parental conflict.

Children will have the opportunity to:

- explore concepts of family, identity, and differences of families
- process their feelings and experiences, whilst building a better understanding around family circumstances
- process their own separation story, while being reassured that family separation is never a child's fault
- explore grief and loss experienced in response to parental separation
- identify safe coping strategies for self-care
- process the experience of living in two houses
 identify the differences between child and adult responsibilities and
- and adult responsibilities and acknowledging the rights of being a child • celebrate their learnings and progress throughout the program.

When and how does it run?

The program runs during school holidays with upcoming sessions published on catholiccare.org/owlkids.

Parent information session runs at the same time of the first group session. The session helps parents to understanding what Owl Kids is about, what the children might be bringing home, and how each parent can support them. An alternate session offers the other parent the opportunity to attend at a different time during the same week.

The final session is a presentation for the parents to attend, showcasing the children's progress and work through the program.




